

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## The Key Stage 4 Curriculum:

Over the last 12 months we have conducted a review of our Key stage 4 curriculum which runs over two years in Year 10 and 11.

The findings of the review were that many of our subjects were struggling to complete the extensive knowledge required by the revised GCSE and Vocational syllabuses.

- In English students' study two GCSEs in Language and Literature and our revised curriculum has extended the time available to complete and excel in both of these subjects.
- In our ambition to support more students achieving good passes within GCSE Maths and GCSE Combined
   Science we have also added additional time to these subjects.
- Triple science has been moved out of the core offer and into the options blocks to secure additional time to complete these three separate GCSE, with time to recover content and prepare for the rigour of the nine exams.
- The new Key stage 4 curriculum now has compulsory subjects of English Language, English Literature, Mathematics, Combined Science, PSHE within Tutor time and Core PE.
- This leaves three free options, each with more time than in the previous curriculum model.

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### The English Baccalaureate - EBACC

The English Baccalaureate (EBACC) is a set of subjects at GCSE that keeps young people's options open for further study and future careers. To be eligible for the EBACC students must study:

- English Language and Literature
- Maths
- The Sciences
- Geography or History
- A modern foreign language (French or German)

The EBACC is made up of subjects which are considered essential to many degrees and opens lots of doors.

A study by the UCL Institute of Education shows that studying subjects included in the EBACC provides students with greater opportunities in further education and increases the likelihood that a pupil will stay on in full-time education. Sutton Trust research reveals that studying the EBACC can help improve a young person's performance in English and Maths.

The government's ambition is to see 90% of pupils studying the EBACC subject combination at GCSE by 2025.



## The Options Process:

It is an exciting time as you begin to think about your next steps here at The Wilnecote School.

The options process allows you to start to choose subjects which you have an interest in or are thinking of pursuing when you leave here for post-16 study.

However, not all subjects are optional, some subjects must be continued during Year 10 and 11.



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## The Options Process:

### Core subjects are:

- English (Language and Literature)
- Maths
- Science (Double award worth 2 GCSES for Biology/Chemistry and Physics)
- PE



### The Options Process:

You are then given the choice of a **further 3 subjects** to study to gain KS4 qualifications.

### When choosing subjects:

- Consider broad and balanced
- What are you interested in studying
- Potential career aspirations

#### What not to do:

- Choose subjects because your friend is
- Choose subjects based on a teacher

### These are:

GCSE Triple Science

- GCSE Computer Science
- GCSE Music



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
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### Why choose Triple Science?

- If you have any aspirations to study A level sciences or any science or engineering-based level 3 course post 16
- You really enjoy science.



### Why stay with Trilogy (Double Award)?

- You have no intention of studying science post 16 and will focus English, the humanities, or the arts.
- You want to focus on other subjects in your option choices.

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
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#### **Successful Computer Science students...**

- have determination when solving problems
- complete homework tasks between lessons to a high standard
- put 100% into lesson tasks, even when things are challenging
- proactively move their learning forwards with independent research
- work cooperatively to complete tasks and find solutions



#### Consideration will be given to the following:

- Over the next two weeks, you will be given the opportunity to complete a small programming project. Your attendance and effort in these sessions will be strongly considered.
- Your monitoring throughout this year in terms of your effort and behaviour in lessons.
- Your outcomes from both programming tasks in lessons, and any assessment tasks and homework set so far this year.
- How much you push to achieve or exceed your target grade in your Computing lessons.
- The determination you show in lessons and the project to independently solve problems and improve your programs.

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### Music:

To choose music you must either:

- Competently play a musical instrument; or
- Be a vocally competent singer
- Be able to read music an understanding of musical notation



You must be prepared and enjoy performing in front of others for example in assembly or as part of an evening to showcase work within class as this forms part of the course.

Please consider these guidelines as you consider what subjects you might want to select for Year 10 and 11.

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
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## **KS4 Grading Systems**

### **GCSE Grading System**



We aim for all our students to achieve at least a Grade 4 in all their KS4 GCSE courses. This allows students to access A-Levels and Level 3 courses at Post 16 study.

### **Vocational Course Grading System**

We aim for all our students to achieve at least a Level 2 Pass in all their KS4 Vocational courses. This allows students to access Level 3 courses at Post 16 study.

What is the difference between Vocational Courses and GCSE's?

Vocational courses focus on practical, work-related skills for specific industries, with hands-on learning and are assessed by a combination of coursework-based assessments and exams.

GCSEs, in contrast, are academic qualifications covering a broad range of subjects, assessed primarily through exams, and are more theoryfocused.

Students must select ONE option from each of the three option blocks. Students must also select one reserve choice from Option Block B or C
